Our milfoil removal efforts begin in May when the fleet is taken out of hibernation, conditioned for this summer's operation which includes replacing the floor of one of the HIPPO's (Hydraulic & Hand Invasive Plant Processing Operation). The milfoil maintenance crew works hard to make sure the working fleet is in tip top condition to avoid any down time with the milfoil operation during the summer. We have training in June with the crew and divers and we plan on beginning the vegetation survey conditional upon the weather. In July the operation begins and runs until the end of September. Most of our operation concentrates in the lower basin in Windham as we try to reach the same level we have achieved to date in the upper basin in Gray; maintaining the beds one week a month rather than on a weekly basis as we are doing in the lower basin. That is not to say we let our guard down in the upper basin, checking targeted coves and newly identified areas on a regular basis. We encourage your involvement by learning the difference between the native plant species and the

invasive variable milfoil. Be vigilant and report anything you feel is suspicious by calling 809-4706 or emailing info@littlesebagolake.com. Marking the spot with a green buoy will further assist us when we respond to the area. If you would like to become a plant patroller to assist us with making sure the infestation does not spread we welcome you. It actually does not take much time and what better place to be than on the lake.

Keep your eyes scanning the waters both above and below the surface and have a great summer doing it!


Watershed Survey Update – Good Progress but More Work is Needed


The Cumberland County Soil and Water Conservation District and the Maine DEP marked 10 years of improvement efforts here and completed the third phase of the Little Sebago Lake Conservation Project over the summer of 2012. The entire Little Sebago watershed was surveyed in 2002 and 2003, and a total of 258 erosion sites were identified through those surveys. In the years since the original surveys, four different grant projects have been completed to address some of the highest priority areas. These grants helped by enabling hundreds of conservation projects to address erosion problem sites.

The third phase, a follow-up survey of the Little Sebago watershed was conducted in 2012 to revisit the original survey sites and identify remaining issues, as well as new areas of concern around the lake. The watershed survey was conducted by staff from CCSWCD and Maine DEP, assisted by volunteers from the LSLA Board of Directors and other concerned lake residents. The survey participants visited over 300 sites throughout the summer to document and photograph conditions and compile information for the DEP's NPS Site Tracker database for future monitoring. Heather True from CCSWCD and Wendy Garland from Maine DEP met with the LSLA Board last fall to present the findings from the updated 2012 survey.

2012 Survey Findings:

The good news is that many of the sites documented in the original surveys have been addressed through the grant projects and/or by landowner initiatives. A total of 146 sites were documented as 'fixed' in the 2012 update. However, there were still another 164 sites identified as ongoing problems. Most of those problems were identified in the earlier surveys, but several new sites were also added. The remaining sites include 20 high impact locations, 61 medium impact areas, and 84 low impact sites. The problem sites include a combination of residential properties (57%), private roads (19%) and driveways (16%), as well as a few other land uses (8%).





Next Steps:

The LSLA Board is working with the expert staff from CCSWCD and DEP to identify possible ways to continue our stewardship efforts throughout the watershed. The options might include:

- LSLA Watershed Subcommittee – a standing group to focus on ongoing efforts, maintain the database, etc.
- Targeted Outreach to Problem Sites – use Site Tracker database information to contact landowners and road associations with identified erosion sites. Inform, educate and offer assistance.
- Clean Water Act Section 319 Grants – several of the high and medium impact sites would be excellent candidates for a new 319 grant since they are more expensive and technically challenging to fix.
- Youth Conservation Corps – The YCC program was used very successfully to address a number of sites from the previous surveys. If funding is available, this would be a great approach for many of the 92 residential sites.
- The LSLA Board included \$5,000 in the 2013 budget for ongoing efforts to contact site owners and offer education materials and low cost assistance in the form of mini-grants or matching funds to fix problems.

HOPKINS DAM REPORT

Water flow through the Hopkins Dam on Little Sebago Lake was restricted by 75% today, April 13, 2013, as we begin the process of bringing the lake to summer level. "Ice Out" essentially happened a week ago, although a few bays still have some ice and snow. The lake can be traveled from the dam to the shore of Twin Brook by boat.

The Hopkins Dam will be inspected by an engineer recommended by the state this summer with an eye on replacing the 6x6 oak seals that after 30 years are starting to leak. After the engineers recommendations and the permitting we will hopefully be able to do the work this fall.

The Dam Committee (Chris Micucci and Rod Bernier) inspected the dam and all agree that the dam is still in very good condition and that the granite blocks show no signs of movement.

The Emergency Action Plan is due to be updated and filed with the state by June 10, 2013. I see no issues that would keep us from meeting the deadline.



WATER QUALITY REPORT



I think most know by now that 2012 was a disaster in terms of water quality on Little Sebago Lake. Going into 2013 the one thing I was hoping would happen, did. We needed the ice cover to get back to a normal time frame. Water temperature is most important to water quality by virtue of the simple fact that cold water holds more oxygen than warm water. Oxygen is as essential to life in the lake as it is to us. The mild 2012 winter followed by hot summer warmed the lake to a record 82 degrees in August. The lake oxygen counts below 6 meters

were well below the 5ppm needed to sustain fish and vegetation.

With the "Ice Out" occurring 5 weeks later this year we are already in a much better position because the water is colder. I will have the ugly 2012 statistics from the DEP/VLMP report at the July Aimhi Membership Meeting along with the reminders of what we as individual homeowners to keep Little Sebago Lake the paradise that it is.






